This easy-to-remember number serves as a universal access point, ensuring that no matter where an individual resides, they can connect with a professional who can offer guidance and support.

Drew Sheard, the Presiding Bishop of the Church Of God In Christ, Inc., expressed his enthusiastic support for the initiative, stating, "This collaboration and PSA are vital steps towards breaking the stigma associated with mental health in our communities.
